By the time of reaching Paris, he had assembled around him about 100,000 men, and met with no opposition. The King's brother and Marshal Ney met him. Ney had some short conversation with him ; after which they embraced each other, Ney exclaiming, "You brought me up, and I will pot fight against you." The British Brig Sherbroke, which arrived here on Monday evening in 8 days from maintax, was boarded by the migh Orpheus, direct from Eugand, with dispatches for the Governor of Nova Scotia The Orpheus left England on the 2d day of April, and brought advices of the progress of the Emperor Napoleon, &c.

A Paris paper of March 24th says, " The king of England is dead ; but it is not certain that the natural heir will quietly possess the crown. The Duke of York has a powerful party, and we are assured that England is divided into two distinct factions."

The crew of the Windsor Castle, brought in by the privateer Roger, were on Wednesday last, put on board a small schr. and sent down to Craney Island, in charge of Mr. Westbrook, an officer of the Roger, with a guard of 8 U. States soldiers. Owing to a low tide, the schr. anchored some distance from the Island, and the prisoners had to be debarked in a row-boat. Mr. Westbrook took 13 of the Englishmen, with 4 of the guard to row the boat, to the Island leaving 11 others in charge of 4 soldiers on board

the schooner. Before his return to the schooner, the prisoners on board rose upon the guard and endeavored to disarm and throw them overbord, in which, owing to the suddenness of the assault, they had nearly succeeded. Mr. Westbrook go alongside the schooner while the soldiers were yet struggling with the superio numbers of their assailants, but they still held their arms. Desirous to quell the mutinous proceedings of the Englishmen, he expostulated, entreated and threatened, but to no purpose, and it was evident from their expressions, that they were determined upon taking possession of the schooner and making their escape in her.
