Any cause for tumult must, however, cease every where in a few days, as already in several places the new barley has come to market, and the rye was expected to be offered for sale yesterday.

The King of the Netherlands continues his tour through West Flanders. He has been at Cambray, Ghent, Nicuport, Ostend, and other places, making himself personally acquainted with the state of the country over which he reigns.

A letter from Valenciennes dated July 14, says- Since the arrival of the Duke of Wellington at his head quarters it is observed that his Grace is very much occupied. Numerous Couriers have been sent to Paris with dispatches, which are supposed to relate to some new negociations between the Allied Powers and France. What is certain is, that the several important personages are expected at Cambray. All this opens a wide field for conjecture, while we are in quiet expectation of the clearing up of these political mysteries.'


