WM. B. BARNEY, Esq. has been nominated by the President of the United States, naval officer of the port of Baltimore, in the place of his father, the late Commodore JOSHUA BARNEY, deceased.

A committee has been appointed in the Legislature of Maryland, consisting of Mess. Kennedy, Breckenridge and E. S. Thomas, to bring in a bill granting to persons possessing the Jewish religion the same civil privileges as are enjoyed by other religious sects, which, it is said has been frequently attempted before, and failed. Some explanation is necessary on this subject—for, in a country where religious liberty fully prevails, these rights cannot be withheld; there is, however, a test oath in the constitution of that state, which no Jew can take, but if he takes it, his rights cannot be curtailed. This oath is evidently in contradiction to the spirit of religious freedom, and it is due to the honor of the state that such darkness and bigotry should no longer prevail. When Baltimore was attacked by the British, some Jews were in Fort M'Henry, assisting to defend the city, and when the shells were falling around them, they did not remember that they were defending the rights of others, of which they could not participate. This is creditable to their patriotism. N. Ad.

**Public Lands.**—By a Report from the Land Office, in pursuance of a resolution of the House of Representatives, it appears that the amount due to the United States for purchases of the Public Lands northwest of the river Ohio, is \$7,290,489. The lands sold prior to the year 1812, have been paid for, or have reverted to the United States, because the period of original credit, and the extension of time for payment, (three years) have expired. The whole amount of sales during the intermediate period have been 14,447,675; and there have been received, by the United States, \$6,615,055 dollars. Nat. Intel.

The proposition to authorize the people of the Alabama territory to form a State Government, and for its admission into the Union, was yesterday under discussion in the Senate. The bill proposes that the Members of the Convention shall be apportioned according to the present territorial apportionment, and that the Convention shall assemble at Huntsville on the 1st Monday in July next. The population, according to a certified copy of the census, laid before the Senate, was, some months ago, found to be 67,000 souls, and has since increased by emigrations in a surprising degree. The sales of public lands in the Alabama territory have been very extensive, and are estimated already to have amounted to ten millions of dollars. During the last year, it is believed the sales have exceeded four millions of dollars in that territory alone. ib.

The Alleghany Bank of Pennsylvania at Bedford, has suspended the payment of specie. A meeting of the stockholders is to take place at the Banking house, on the third Monday of January next, for the purpose of considering the propriety of dissolving the institution and closing the concerns of the stockholders.

The treaty, between the United States and Spain, concluded at Madrid in 1802, (the ratification of which on the part of Spain has been so long delayed) was finally ratified and exchanged in the city of Washington, on the 21st inst. by J. Q. Adams, secretary of state, and Don Luis de Onis, minister plenipotentiary from Spain.

This Treaty, provides for the settlement, by the arbitration of Commissioners, and in the most unexceptionable manner, of all claims, prior to the year 1802, of the citizens of Spain and of the United States, respectively, for losses sustained by the deprivations of citizens of the two governments, prior to the year 1802.

The claims for spoiliations by French privateers carrying their prizes into the ports of Spain, during the same period, and which have been ever since the subject of negotiation, are not provided for. They are, however, expressly reserved, and the existence of the claims thus distinctly recognized.

**NORTHERN CANAL.**—The season for working on the Canal having closed, it may be gratifying to the public to learn, (says the Albany Daily Advertiser,) that the operations have been so far successful, that the digging and excavating of the Canal, in its whole extent, from Fort Edward to Whitehall, with some trifling exceptions, have been completed; and that a doubt no longer remains, unless there should be a failure in some of the contractors in building and constructing the locks, and which is far from being anticipated, as much of the materials are already collected and prepared, this Canal will be finished, and a water communication opened between Lake Champlain and the Hudson river, before the close of another season.

**Valuable Improvement.**—A few days since (says the Albany Register) we had occasion to call at the shop of Messrs. Van Vechten and Seymore, blank book manufacturers and fancy binders, where we witnessed with

much pleasure an improvement which cannot but be interesting to the merchant and mechanic. It was a machine which ruled both sides of the sheet at once, and with a rapidity and beauty truly astonishing. By means of this labor saving machine, (the inventor of which we do not recollect) paper can be ruled at about 75 per cent. cheaper than heretofore. Those acquainted with the process of ruling for blank books, can appreciate its value when we inform them that two lads in the shop have repeatedly ruled a ream of paper on both sides in twelve minutes.

**THE REMEDY FOUND.**

After volumes of essays have been written, to point out the cause and the cure for the present distresses and scarcity of specie money, a discerning observer of men and things, points in three words to the true source and remedy of this grievous disorder; *excessive importations, founded on, and encouraged by, a ruinous spirit of luxury and extravagance.*

Let but our countrymen, young and old, rising superior to prejudice and ceasing to run after the follies, fashions, and vices of Europe, resolve to adopt a system of rigid and honorable economy in all their habits and household;—let them take pride in consuming our own productions, and in dressing in our own manufactures; instead then of an unusual balance of 20 millions against us, foreign countries will fall in our debt, cheerfulness and abundance will laugh she-riffs and jails out of countenance, and we shall no longer have our ears bedazzled with the cry of—no specie, no discounts, notes laying over, property given to trustees, and families reduced by extravagance to poverty, contempt, and vice:—Such is the opinion of a real true blooded American yankee. **From Venezuela.**—We have a letter from Venezuela of Nov. 6, and a paper of a late date. Bolivar had by a proclamation resigned his office to the people, who were to elect a successor. He declared he would accept of a military station only, and the first day of peace he would retire to private life. Our correspondent represents him as an imbecile usurper who resigns from necessity only. It is believed the Independents will obtain their object during the present campaign. N. Y. Columbian.

**From the Mississippi State Gazette.**

There is a report in circulation that the establishment of the French on the Trinity, under the auspices of general Lallemande, has been broken up by 200 Spanish troops. This rumor we apprehend is false, and has been probably put afloat to subserve speculating objects.—An agent was lately despatched by our government, to advise general Lallemande, that it was their wish he should remove his establishment beyond the limits of the United States—to which he yielded his consent, and has probably ere this departed. It is believed that the United States is about to occupy with a military force, the country we purchased, under the name of Louisiana, as far west as the Rio Del Norte, and it is owing to this determination, that they requested general L. to withdraw his military force.

It is stated that the arrival of our agent, at the moment he did, alone prevented a declaration of war by general L. against Spain. It is probable that he will now direct his course into the interior of Mexico.

A late number of the London monthly Magazine announces the success of another application of philosophy to the arts of life, which appears to be equally important with that of the discovery of gas lights and steam engines, and which is so pregnant with advantages, and so extensive in its purposes, as to threaten an entire revolution in the economy and formation of our domestic establishments. It appears by experiments, that steam, carried in pipes nearly half a mile in length, has suffered in the extremity no sensible diminution of heat; consequently, hot steam may be diffused for the purpose of heating rooms in a radius from the boiler of at least half a mile, and perhaps even of two, three or more miles. The great advantages of this discovery need not be enumerated.—A bushel of refuse coal and cinders, costing perhaps 20 cents, will boil a copper for fifteen hours, and generate steam enough to keep ten or twelve large rooms at a uniform and equally diffused temperature of sixty or seventy degrees. ### From the Boston Patriot, Dec. 21.

### LATEST FROM ENGLAND.

The ship Triton, Capt. Holcomb, arrived here yesterday in 18 days from Liverpool. By this vessel, we have received from our correspondent, London papers to the 1st of November, inclusive—and are indebted to Mr. Topitt for Liverpool papers to the 2d—nearly a fortnight later than former advices. We have given as many extracts as our time and limits would permit.

The Triton brings despatches to the Secretary of State of the U. States, containing the Treaty of Commerce concluded by Mr. Gallatin with the British Commissioners.

The London Courier of Oct. 23, contains the commercial treaty between this country and Sweden, negotiated by the hon. Jonathan Russell.

The British army is to be reduced 35,000 men. Orders have been issued to the recruiting parties in London, to suspend recruiting men until further orders.

The king of England has completed the 55th year of his reign, being two years longer than any monarch who ever before reigned in England. On the demise of the queen it is said to be the intention of the ministry to propose to parliament a greatly diminished establishment for the king at Windsor. The care of his majesty to be confided to the Duke of York, who is to have an additional allowance for his services.

### LIVERPOOL, Oct. 31.

All the allied sovereigns and their ministers, except the emperor of Austria, have now left Aix la Chapelle, and have repaired to the frontiers of France, in order to review for the last time, the army of occupation, before its final departure.

Some transports are expected to
