Since the departure of the two battalions of the guards, the regiment of Guadalaxara and another have replaced them; they are both animated with the liveliest enthusiasm in favor of the constitution. These two bodies have given manifest proofs of their adhesion to the new system of government. The troops continue marching towards the interior, they have appointed Seville as their head quarters. Since the 18th, the fleet, the different forts and batteries, the intrenchment, and the Isle of Leon, resound with continual discharges of cannon. De la Carunna, March 22 .- The organization of this province is rapidly increasing; all the troops of the line that we could dispose of are marching to the frontiers of Castile, and the Junta, jointly



In the neighborhood of Odessa, in the south of Russia, there are schools for more than ten thousand Russian troops. The Cossacs particularly are said to make extraordinary progress in reading and writing.

Several artists at Rome have collected all the letters and manuscripts of Raphael, and mean to publish them on the next anniversary of the death of that celebrated painter. Frederick Schlegel will shortly publish Travels in Italy, relating chiefly to its litera-ture and fine arts. He accompanied the Emperor of Austria on his late tour. The same author has undertaken a German translation of the posthumous works of Ma-dam de Stael.
