DEAR FATHER-I am daily and impatiently expecting a letter from you, and hope you have before this time received my last. On Wednesday I received my awful sentence, but dear father, I acknowledged to the court, then, as I did before to you, the strict justice of it. Yes, I know that my hands are polluted with blood; and my conscience-oh it is burdened with the crime into which I have been drawn. Little did I expect when I left our happy home and an affectionate father, that before I could see you again, I should have incurred such guilt, and be a tenant of this doleful cell .- Would to God I had rejected the first proposalwhich was that we should go and get a sum of money, which Hutton assured me he knew we could get, with ease and certainty. The plan was not fully explained to me until we got to Wilmington-of the murder I knew nothing until we were returning from the place the first night, and when my terror prevented the execution of the plan. ANECDOTE OF DR. FRANKLIN. Related by Mr. Jefferson in a letter of the 4th of De-

cember, 1818. When the Declaration of Independence was under the consideration of Congress, there were two or three unlucky expressions in it, which gave ofence to some members. The words 'Scotch and other auxiliaries' excited the ire of a gentleman or two of that country. Severe strictures on the conduct of the British King, in negativing our repeated repeals of the law which permitted the importation of slaves, were disapproved by some southern entlemen, whose reflections were not yet matured to the full abhorrence of that traffic. Although the offensive expressions were immediately yielded, those gentlemen continued their depredations on other parts of the instrument. I was sitting by Dr. Franklin, who perceived that I was not insensible o the mutilations. 'I have made it a rule,' said he, whenever it is in my power, to avoid becoming the draughtsman of papers to be reviewed by a public body. I took my lesson from an incident which I will relate to you. When I was a journeyman printer, one of my companions, an apprentice hatter, having served out his time, was about to open shop for himself. His first concern was to have a handsome sign-board, with a proper inscription. He composed it in the following words: John Thompson, Hatter, makes and sells hats for ready money,' with the figure of a hat subjoined. But he thought he would submit it to his friends for their amendments. The first he showed it to, tho't the word 'hatter' tautologous, because followed by the words 'makes hats,' which shewed he was a hatter. It was struck out. The next observed that he word 'makes' might as well be omitted, because his customers would not care who made the hats ; if good and to their mind, they would buy, by whomsoever made. He struck it out. A third said he thought the words 'for ready money' were useless, as it was not the custom of the place to sell on credit, every one who purchased expected to pay. They were parted with, and the inscription now stood, 'John Thompson sells hats.' 'Sells hats.' says his next friend; 'why nobody will expect you to give them away. What then is the use of that word!' It was stricken out, and 'hats' followed it, the rather, as there was one painted on the board; so his inscription was reduced ultimately to 'John

Thompson,' with the figure of a hat subjoined.
