

SHOCKING ACCIDENT IN ST. LOUIS-A Young Lady Burned to Death .- A shocking accident occurred at the residence of Mrs. Reilly, in St. Louis, on Sunday last, which resulted in the death of a young lady named Ann Ravel. The St. Louis Republican says :

Miss Ravell had just returned home from church, and hurriedly approached the fire blasing on the hearth, to warm her hands .--Upon turning suddenly around, the skirt of her dress, which was greatly expanded by hoops, took fire, and instantly enveloped her in flames. Mrs. Reilly was the only person present at the time of the accident, and became so papie strickin on witnessing the agonizing situation of Miss Ravell, as to be almost unable to render any assistance, or even to give the alarm to the adjoining neighbors.

Miss Ravell, well nigh smothered by the flames and smoke, with her olothes nearly burned from her body, and suffering the most excruciating torture, rushed wildly from the room toward an alley leading to Tenth street. Her sudden movement fanned the flames that were consuming her, and consequently but increased the indescribable misery she endured. She had, however, scarce y reached the open air, when a heavy blanket was thrown over her body by Mrs. Rielly. By this time the poor girl had lost her strength, and bewildered by her intense pain, and almost sufficated by the deadly inhalation which it was impossible to avoid, she fell at the very touch of the blanket. The groans and ories

of the sufferer were heart-rending in the oztreme : but the spectacle that was presented on removing the blanket was appalling. But a few shreds of the dress remained, and disclosed at once the terrible havoc made by the flames The whole body, from the feet to the neck, was trightfully burned. She lived until the next morning.
