FRANCE AND PRUSSIA. From the condensed news column of the Baltimore Gazette, we make up the following

TURSDAY'S NEWS. The Emperor is reported to have said, in speaking of the courage and discipline of the Prussian soldiers, that nothing could keep them out of Paris. One of the letters found in the balloon which descended at Neufchatel stated that Bazaine was well supplied with everything at Metz, and that the French had been successful in every fight to the 31st of August.

Bismarck says that Metz and Strasbourg must be evacuated, or Paris is to be starved out. The Germans ridicule the idea of Bazaine being able to escape from Metz. General Sheridan writes that the French were always beaten, and that the resistance of Paris cannot save France. The Russian Govern-ment has removed all its deposits—some 40,-000,000 roubles-from the Bank of France. A despatch to the Herald tells of a severe fight between a French reconnoitering force and 89,000 Prussians, ten miles from Paris, in which, after inflicting heavy loss on the enemy, the French were driven back, the

Prussians occupying the position. Earl Granville is reported to have made some suggestions to M. Thiers in an interview on Friday last, which, it would seem, he has communicated to his Government, and from this has resulted the proposed interview be-tween Bismarck and Jules Favre. It is said that they are now in communication, and there is reason for the belief that a successful

negotiation for peace will result. Despatches have been received in London which destroy all hopes of Bazaine's escape from Metz. by the French artillery.". The people of Strasbourg have taken a vote upon the question of surrendering, and by a large majority determined to defend the place to the last. General Ulrich is reported to have been badly wounded.

Paris seems to be now completely isolated. Telegraphic communication with Tours has ceased, mail service in all directions stopped and the railroads cut and descroyed. Letters are carried to and from Paris by messengers

A telegram from Orleans tells of a serious engagement which had taken place near Visoux, between twenty-five thousand French and fifteen thousand Prussians. The latter attacked, and were, it is reported, moved down by the French artillery and forced to fall back, after suffering heavy loss.

The Czar has written a congratulatory letter to the Queen of Prussia, in which he extols the wonderful ability and soldierly qualities of the Prussians, A despatch from Berlin totally denies all the reports about Russia's arming, and its being opposed to the dismemberment of France, characterizing them as sensational. It adds, however, that the feeling towards France there is very fa-

MISCELLANEOUS. Napoleon's Escape from Ham.

A writer in one of the English magazines who has recently been preparing a series of articles entitled, "The Early Days of Napoleon III," gives a description of the Prince's escape from Ham, where he was undergoing a perpetual imprisonment. The account is absorbing, both from the inherent interest of the circumstances and the straightforwardness with which they are recounted :'

On the 23rd of May, 1846, Louis Napoleon was visited by some English gentlemen enough to ensure remunerative dividends to them to lend him their passports, on the kand safely housed in Brussels. > pardonable. For this offense he was tried at Peronne on the 15th of July, 1846. He neither extenuated nor vaunted the acts of which he was accused. He simply said that what he had done was in obedience to the dictates of his heart, his attachment and his gratitude. In spite of the eloquence of his counsel, Maitre Nogent Saint Lourent, one of the most brilliant advocates of the court of Paris, who said very fine things very little to the purpose, he was condemned to three months' imprisonment, a sentence which, under the circumstances, may be looked upon as another form' of "severely reprimanded;" because when a man has undergone a five years' imprisonment, and remains in prison after its expiration for the sake of attending a prisoner for life, it is laughable, contemptible, to give that man "three months" for helping the perpetual prisoner to regain his liberty. Charles Thelin, never a prisoner himself, but merely a prisoner's valet de chambre, was condemned pour contumace, in his absence, because he was not present himself to take his trial, to six months durance vile. Whether six months or sixty, it would be all the same to him when once beyond the gripe of the French gendarmes. We may here add that when Louis Napoleon became Prince President, Dr. Conneau was still his physician and friend.


