Exclusion of Free Blacks.—The Tennessee Legislature have passed an Act forbidding free blacks from coming into the State to remain more than twenty days. The penalty is a fine of from ten to fifty dollars, and confinement in the penitentiary from one to two years. Double the highest penalty is to be inflicted after the first offence. The Act also prehibits first offence. The Act also prohibits manumission, without an immediate removal from the State.
