



FOREIGN.

FROM EUROPE.

By the packet Sheffield, the editors of the New York Commercial Advertiser have received files of London papers to the 8th Nov. and Liverpool to the 9th, both inclusive.

ENGLAND.—The situation of England from the riots and the apprehension of an invasion by the cholera, appears to be gloomy on a cursory survey; but on a close examination we believe that there is nothing so alarming in the prospect, even in case of further opposition to the Reform Bill.

DUBLIN, Nov. 5.—Mr. O'Connell entered the Court of Chancery to-day at half past 12 o'clock, with a silk gown and full bottomed wig, and stood at the bar.

FRANCE.—The Pezrago Bill was to be carried up to the House of Peers on the 7th, and it was expected that the Minister of the preceding day would contain the nominations of a new batch of Peers, from 50 to 60.

PORTUGAL.—It appears that the British Government has found it necessary or expedient to stop the expedition of Don Pedro. It is said Don Miguel was so much alarmed by the apprehension of its approach, that he actually suspended the execution of sentence of death upon 37 soldiers who had proclaimed Donna Maria.

HOLLAND.—The King of Holland had not at the latest date from the Hague (the 6th) made known his intentions relative to accepting the twenty-four articles of the London Treaty.

THE POLES.—The London Times, referring to the Address of the Polish Refugees to their fellow countrymen, says, "Between 30,000 and 40,000 of the best citizens of Poland are now in foreign lands.

RESOLUTIONS recommending General Jackson to the People of the United States for the Presidency, have been adopted by the House of Representatives of Georgia, as a substitute for the resolutions of the Senate, with but one dissenting voice, which was Mr. Powell.

GEORGIA.—The Macon (Ga.) Advertiser states that a bill for abolishing the Penitentiary system, has passed the House of Representatives of that State by a majority of between twenty and thirty.

PENNSYLVANIA.—In the House Delegates of Pennsylvania, on the 17th ultimo, Mr. Vansant offered the following resolution, which was laid on the table:

Resolved, That the committee on the Judicial System be instructed to inquire into the expediency of passing a law to protect the good citizens of this Commonwealth against the evils arising from the emigration of free-blacks from other States into Pennsylvania.

MARYLAND.—The Legislature assembled on the 26th ult. B. S. Forrest has been elected President of the Senate, and Richard Thomas, Speaker of the House.

RAIL-ROADS IN NEW YORK.—Applications will be presented to the next Legislature of New York for acts of incorporation for twenty-five different Rail-roads, with an aggregate capital of forty-one millions of dollars.

LYNCHBURG AND NEW RIVER RAIL ROAD.—The Richmond papers inform us, that when the books closed in that city, 3041 shares had been subscribed.

THE COMMITTEE OF FINANCE will next week have under consideration, the resolutions of inquiry concerning the land tax, &c., and the hope is strongly cherished, that a plan will be devised, which, while it will settle the land titles in the West, will be effective in preventing delinquencies of tax-payers.

A singular fact is made known by the report of the census just made to Congress, in regard to the comparative longevity of Whites and Blacks in this country.

IN NEW YORK, last week, there were 136 deaths. Of this number 38 were of Consumption, 15 of Scarlatina Fever, and 9 of Influenza.

THE TAVERN HOUSE occupied by Mr. Daniel Smith, and owned by Mr. Benz, in Funkstown, Md. was destroyed by fire on the morning of the 24th ult.

ARRIVAL EXTRAORDINARY.—The elegant and mammoth-sized Car Columbus arrived at the Depot yesterday afternoon. She is said to be capable of containing one hundred passengers.
