EXTRACT From a speech delivered in the U. S. Senate, on the 6th inst., by Mr. TILGHAM of Virginia.

It was singular indeed, that the Senator (Mr. Tyler) resist the measure of the present President. He had himself given Administration as liberal support, as it reasonably could be expected, but could not quite so far as the Senator from Maine in approval of its principles and measures.

If we drive her citizens into the morasses where Mafias and Samplers found refuge, we have had trodden her in dust, and we have trodden her citizens, slaughtered their wives and children, and established a millinery despotism in South Carolina, where should we find the glory and honor of the enterprise?

Such are the arguments of those who claim to be the most ardent, consistent, and disinterested friends of the Union.

There is neither caricature nor exaggeration in them, as here detailed. Never were language and conduct so diametrically opposed to each other. And yet, without doubt, a large portion of the people who present this singular contradiction, are perfectly sincere.
