Letter to the Editor of the Virginia Free Press, from a highly intelligent gentleman of Virginia now on a visit to the metropolis of the U. States:

WASHINGTON CITY, 1st MARCH, 1833.

Mr. Editor—So deeply interesting was the proceedings in the Senate to-day, that I cannot forbear to give you a brief outline.

Mr. Dallas delivered a very forcible and argumentative speech in opposition to Mr. Clay's Bill, enumerating the injuries which the manufacturers must sustain should it pass—reprehending, with severity, the friends of the American System, for their abandonment of principle—and expressing his regret that they who have upheld the Tariff in its inciplency and progress, should now be the very men originating and urging the adoption of a bill to modify. Mr. Ewing, of Ohio, succeeded Mr. D. in an able speech, charging him with looking through a telescope, in which a small insect was secreted, and which convertingly and the property of the sense passed finally upon Mr. Clay's Tariff Bill, which had

Mr. Mengum, of N.
