On the Sabbath, the Lord's Supper was administered in the Presbyterian Church, to a very large number of communicants, drawn together by the occasion, from the surrounding country.

\$250,000 Stocks.—The Treasurer of the Commonwealth has favored us with the following memorandum of the sale of stocks effected by him on Friday last:

MEMORANDUM of sales of \$250,000 of State Stock, made pursuant to an act of Assembly, passed the 23rd February, 1833, "authorizing a subscription by the State of Virginia to the Stock of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company"—viz: \$1,000 at \$5 25 premium per \$100 1,000 " 5 00 " " " 50,000 " 3 75 " " " 50,000 " 3 75 " " " 148,000 " 3 50 " " " \$250,000.
