**Winchester and Potomac RAIL ROAD.**  
TO CONTRACTORS FOR EXCAVATION AND MASONRY.

IMPORTANT IMPROVEMENT.
Some months ago we published a description of an invention which had been practically applied at the Flour Mill of Nathan Tyson, Esq. of this city, for the purpose of keeping flour sweet for a length of time in warm climates. The process is as follows:—The flour, after it is milled, is passed through a sieve, and then it is manufactured, through a heated chamber, the temperature of which is sufficient to expel from it whatever natural moisture or dampness it may contain, without any injury whatever to the valuable properties of the flour, but on the contrary imparting to it a longer life, and in some instances, several experiments have been made with flour manufactured in this manner, in order to prove its value, by submitting it to the test of the action of hot climates in various parts of the world. It has been carried on the long voyages around Cape Horn, and was found sweet and sound on arrival, and in some instances, it has been carried to the tropics, and it has been found to retain its quality in the most insalubrious climates. The inventor of this process, who has secured a very handsome profit to the exporter which ordinary shipments could not have realized. We have before us a letter from one of the most respectable houses at Gibraltar, to which a small parcel of this flour had been sent, as an experiment, and containing the following conclusive testimony in regard to it. The letter says:—"It is now six months since the landing of your shipment, which has this day been examined by the contractors for the supply of the troops of the garrison, and by them pronounced as sweet as though just from the mill."

The Galenian of the 27th ult. says—
Capt. Low, of the United States Army, who passed through this place last week, informed us, that the Winnebago Indians, of Rock river, who were removed to Dodge north of the Wisconsin, or a great part of them, have returned to their old camping ground, near the four lakes, and are engaged in gathering rice and hunting as formerly. They say there is no game north of the Wisconsin, and they cannot live there. They talk of planting corn next season on Rock river.
The troops at Fort Winnebago would be amply adequate, it is believed, to keep those Indians off the ceded land. But we are informed that they have no instructions to that effect—that matter being confided, exclusively, to Colonel Dodge, and the dragon corps under his command. We have reason to suppose, that so soon as these facts are made known, that a speedy remedy will be applied.
Indian Treaty.—We understand that a treaty has been negotiated with the Indians west of Lake Michigan, for the cession of all their lands between that Lake and the Mississippi, and of their reservations in the peninsula of Michigan. The commissioners, Gov. Porter, Col. Owen, and Col. Weatherford, have procured the relinquishment of the Indian title to this valuable region upon favorable terms, and deserve much credit for the successful result of the negotiation. This cession extinguishes the Indian title to land north of the Ohio, and east of the Mississippi, with the exception of the Miami reservation on the Wabash, and the district north of Grand River, in Michigan.—[Washington Globe.

It is said that the force of the explosion of the New-England, was so great as to throw a piece of one of the boilers to the distance of two miles, whilst a large fragment, weighing several tons, was cast on the top of the wheel house. Some of the descriptions which have been given of the consequences of this explosion, are truly appalling. It is time that some decided measures should be adopted to prevent these disasters, for they may be most certainly and effectually guarded against. It appears that there is a law in England providing that the boiler of every steam engine shall be tested, quarterly, at three times the strength which it is licensed to use, and none but the officers of the government have access to the safety valve. Since the passage of this law, not a single steam-boat explosion has occurred.—[Balt. Gaz.
