It is now reduced to matter of fact, that Mr. McLane has resigned his office of Secretary of State, (his nomination to which, though held since March, 1833, has never been submitted to the Senate.)

The appointment of the latter as Secretary of the Treasury, no one has ever expected to see confirmed by the Senate. Indeed it is likely never to be presented to that body, nor is it much more probable his nomination as Secretary of State will be sent to at the present session.

The reader will note the phraseology of the Globe, when speaking of Mr. McLane's exit. It says "the resignation is to take effect as soon during the present session of Congress as it may be convenient for the President to appoint [not nominate] a successor."

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Governor HAYES, of South Carolina, has issued an official paper, in the nature of an Executive Proclamation, on the subject of the late decision of the Court of Appeals against the Test Oath.

The Governor does not consider the crisis to require the summoning of an extra session of the legislature, as had been suggested in other quarters, but refers the whole subject to the next legislature, to be chosen in October. The test oath being adopted by a vote of four-fifths of the present legislature, will, if passed by a similar vote in the next, be legally incorporated into the State constitution.
