John Richards was by the great Sir Archy his dam was by Rattler, sometimes called Rattle—not Dr. Thornton's. Rattler was esteemed in this country no less as a race horse than a stallion; he was several times winner in this state (North Carolina) when a colt, and subsequently in South Carolina, particularly at Charleston; he was by the old imported horse Shark; his dam by the celebrated race mare Lady Lega, who was also the dam of the unequalled race horse Collector; she was by the imported horse Centinel, her dam by the imported horse Fearnoo, but of a mare that was imported by Mr. Randolph of Virginia. His (John Richards's) g. dam by the old imported horse Medley, his g. g. dam by old Wildair, his g. g. g. dam by Non Pariel out of an imported mare. Sir Archy (John Richards's sire) was by the imported Diomed, out of the imported mare Castiline, she by Rockingham out of Tabitha, Rockingham by Highflyer out of Purty, sister to Pumpkin; Purty by Matchem, out of the old Squirt mare, who produced 17 colts—3 were never trained, 2 died young, and the other 14 were good runners.

John Richards's colts from blooded mares bid fair to make good fine horses. I have run three with race, all of which he won, beating Mr. Stevens's celebrated Black Maria, Johnson's Nollie and others. Betsy Richards his first sister, has won more than perhaps almost any other nag in Virginia at all distances—I saw the trial, a single 4 mile heat between John Richards, Betsy Richards, Children and sample Betsy Richards was sent to John Richards in the trial, and the jury verdict was—Henry did not run in the trial, because John Richards and himself were owned by the same man, had always been trained in the same stable, and it was known John Richards was the best of the two. This trial decided that John Richards should run the great match against Eclipse; but becoming lame, Henry was substituted.
