HEAD QUARTERS, Eastern Division, United States Army, Augusta, Me., March 31, 1850.—The undersigned, a Major General in the army of the United States, being especially charged with maintaining the peace and safety of their entire Northern and Eastern frontiers, having cause to apprehend a collision of arms between the proximate forces of New Brunswick and the State of Maine on the disputed territory...

Mr. Watkins moved to reverse the decision of the Committee. This motion gave rise to some debate, in which the merits of the Geological Survey were discussed.

The Southern Literary Messenger.—The March number of this valuable and interesting magazine has just been received. Its contents are not less interesting than those of any preceding number. As usual, the articles are wholly original, and indicate, with few exceptions, considerable literary talent in their writers.

There can be no question about Sir John Harvey's having obeyed the positive instructions of the British Government in his recent course. In a letter to Mr. Fox, he has said that he is expressly stated. This, then, will be the only serious ground of difficulty, we apprehend, for the British Government is not in the habit of backing out. However, we still hope for the prevalence of wise counsels and a pacific course.

It appears from the report of the Board of Public Works for Illinois, that the internal improvement system in that State embraces 1312 miles of railroad, estimated to cost \$11,000,000. In the canal from the Illinois River to the Michigan, will cost several millions, and it has been in rapid progress for some time.

The New York Cultivator states that fruit trees may be propagated by planting the scions instead of engraving them. They should be prepared by dipping both ends in melted tallow, grafting wax, or some similar article, and then be planted horizontally, with the bud uppermost, and covered about three inches deep. They will produce trees that will yield fruit in four years.
