**THE ST. LOUIS GAZETTE OF THE 9th ult.** says: "Bombs have arrived here within the last week from the falls of the Missouri, nearly three thousand miles distant in a northerly direction; from Pittsburgh, 1300 miles eastward; and from New Orleans 1200 miles to the south, bringing them from the furthest north, lumber from the Allegheny, and sugar from the South, in the product of one territory. We had in port yesterday 46 steamboats from 75 to 600 tons burthen—a larger number and a far greater amount of tonnage than ever before floated in our harbor."
