But, although the Kingdom of Christ was not of this world, and although Christ himself canonically assumed all direct dominion with existing institutions, religious or political, it was distinctly foreseen, even during his life, and still more clearly immediately after his death, that the Mosaic law, the Roman worship of idols, and the Roman dominion over tributary provinces, must eventually be abolished by a system of religious and moral reform, exercising its influence in the world, his Master, cannot possibly fail of coming to the conclusion that all violence, tyranny, and oppression, all extension of unjust power by man over man, must ultimately fall before it. In the book of futurity, therefore, it is written as clearly as in the Gospel of Christ, that war and slavery shall be abolished, and that the rights of man shall be secured, and that all that is contrary to the law of God shall be removed. That of the period of the history of mankind, and this purification of the human character, it is to be accomplished, we have no distinct revelation, nor is it humanly competent to foresee.

MEXIA was tried by a court martial, sentenced to death, and shot at 5 o'clock the same day.
