MR. THE BOUNDARY LINE.—The Baltimore Patriot publishes a copy of an important map, which first appeared in the U. S. Geographical Magazine. LATER FROM MAINE.

The Committee of the Maine Legislature to whom Gov. Fairbanks's message was referred, on Friday last, reported to the House of Representatives the following resolutions: That whenever the Governor of this State shall be for a second time elected to the office of Governor of the province of New Brunswick, or otherwise, that he has abandoned all idea of occupying the disputed territory with a military force or of attempting an expulsion of the civil force sent there under our land agent—that then the Governor of this State be authorized to withdraw our military force, leaving the land agent with a sufficient posse, armed or unarmed as the case may require, to protect the territory.

THE ELECTIONS.
