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LOCO FOCO TRIUMPH IN NEW YORK.

The combination of Locos, Tylers, and odd-and-ends, carried the New York City election, for Mayor and Councilmen, by a majority of nearly 8000.

Exuberant as it is, the City, but the signs of the coming trouble as to the Presidency are already developed. The Van Buren and Calhoun factions are giving out calls for meetings in behalf of their respective champions, and the Tyler (the American) expresses great confidence that the Democratic party will compromise the difficulty by appointing a democratic Administration.

At Dublin on the 3d the great repeal debate in the chamber of the Town Council was brought to a close. On the whole, the vote stood: For O'Connell's motion, 41; Against it, including the Lord Mayor's vote, 15; Majority in favor of "separation," 26.
