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PROTECTIVE DUTIES.

The Locos are ever and anon prating about the question of "Protective" duties, and endeavoring to prejudice one section of the country against the other on this important matter, as though protection was not general, but confined to a particular sphere or section of country, which is not the fact, as it is wide and extended, protecting the Manufacturer of the North and the South, the Ironmonger, Tailor, Shoemaker, and other mechanics of the country, all are alike embraced, and come within the range of protection. They fall as they are in favor of a tariff sufficient to meet the current expenses of the Government, and yet it will be remembered that when the question of laying an impost duty on Tea and Coffee came up, these same individuals, who were "in favor of a tariff for revenue alone," voted against it, which was for no other purpose than to manufacture political capital. These articles (tea and coffee) have been enumerated with those upon which duties have been laid ever since the foundation of the government—but which was relieved therefrom in 1822 or '23, when the revenue of the country was more than sufficient to meet the wants and demands of the Government, and thereby was also removed in order to benefit the Tariff interest in other particulars.

By the vote of the Locos on the proposition to tax Tea and Coffee, we find the emphasis of their professions when they tell us they are in favor of a tariff for revenue—for here were articles which clearly came in the proper sphere for laying duties upon—articles in which the question of protection could not be raised—our domestic productions can never come in competition therewith, and they refused by their vote to give this additional revenue to the country that might be raised by this means, where the question of protection could not be made a question!

SOFT-SWEDDING with a vengeance. The Boston American, one of the per seculent Tyler prints, in speaking upon certain matters relative to the "Tyler party," makes use of the following "instructive" language to office-holders, which for suppleness we have never seen before:

"Our President has been charged with falsehood, publicly and privately, in this city, and in rain has waited for two years, to see those in office under him come forward in his defence. Even his amiable and talented children have been abused, vilified, and slandered, but not an office-holder, not one of those who are 'rising here upon the feet of the land, receiving thousands and thousands per annum, through the kindness of the honest Virginian, John Tyler, and his gifted, guileless children has had the honesty or the gratitude to come forward and say the merciful slanders, it is not so, John Tyler is an honest man—his children are not less so."

It is not base ingratitude in these office-holders to treat the "honest Virginian" with so little respect?—not to say a word in favor of their benefactor—not to come forward in his defence, when he is receiving the anathemas, the scorn, and contempt of the country—to remain quiet when his gifted and guileless children have been abused, vilified, and slandered? Ho, all ye office-holders! ye who have not heretofore "had the honesty or the gratitude," come forth, and "say to those merciful slanders, that John Tyler is an honest man!" Unloose your tongues, if they are cleaven to the roof of your mouths—and pour forth in rapturous strains in one accord, the "honesty" of the President, and the "guilelessness" of his "amiable and talented children!"

MORE PROUBLE. Capt. Tyler has been making a purchase in Pennsylvania, and the Globe, Enquirer and Pennsylvania swear he has got a "bite." They have set to work in good earnest to prove that James Madison Porter, brother of the Governor of the "Krystone State," is not a Democrat of the first water, and cannot carry over the party with him, whatever might have been the design in making him Minister of War. The Madisonian and American Sentinel, on the other hand, declared he is the "true grit," and give his regular pedigree. We are inclined to think the Commander in Chief will be compelled to call out the militia to quell the insurrection among the followers of the Democratic camp. We shall have a "pretty mess" of it before the combatants get through. All the Whigs have to do is to keep cool, and go to the polls at the proper time.

Willoughby Newton, Esq. has been nominated by the Whigs of Westmoreland, King George and Spotsylvania, as the Whig candidate for Congress from the Eighth District, in opposition to R. M. T. Gwynn.

THE APPOINTMENT OF THE PRESIDENT.

The North American states that Gen. Cass has declared his intention of being a candidate for the Presidency, subject, however, to the decision of the Democratic National Convention. The General avows his hostility to a National Bank, which of course is the great "pre-requisite" for a "democratic" candidate—but he decries all the capital made by this speech, with his southern friends, when in the same breath he declares himself in favor of Protection to Hogs!

Every breeze that wafts along, now-a-days, bears upon it the name of "distinguishing" champion of democracy, who degrades his willingness to "serve" his friends, in the way of being a candidate for the Presidency—has added fresh difficulties to those already at hand, for the National Convention to settle—turbulent and factious spirits are multiplying with a rapidity that has no precedent. The Convention will be made up of a "mongrel brood," which will be gotten together for the purpose of nominating a candidate, but whose creeds are dissimilar, and of such a variety of "shreds and patches," that for want of identity, they will be found jarring and contending for their several preferences, in boisterous tones, and with threatening menaces, picturing off the discomfiture that will follow in the wake of the Convention, unless their particular favorite be nominated—and thus the deliberations of the body will close, without effecting that "union and harmony," and that "concert of action," which the great apostle of democracy—Mr. Ritchie—promises, will be effected by its meeting.

"HIGH" proposition to the "ENQUIRER." The Richmond Whig made a proposition to the Enquirer to publish the "Democratic" State Committee's Address, if they in turn will publish the Whig Address, thus evincing on their part a desire that the people should see "both sides," and judge for themselves.

The proposition has as yet been referred to pass by unheeded by the sagacious editor of the Enquirer, he rather manifesting a perfect willingness to keep his friends "in the dark," upon the great measures of public policy, which are there discussed. To obviate any objections that might be raised in the way of additional expense in paying for composition, the Whig proposes to make good any extra expense that the Enquirer may incur. The failure of Mr. Ritchie to accede to this proposition will be proof positive that he is fearful of letting the "democracy" have a fair exposition of Whig principles.

The Winchester Virginian states that Col. Wm. Carson has declined representing the Senatorial district composed of Warren, Page and Shenandoah, and that A. J. O'Bannon, Esq. formerly of Jefferson, has been announced as a candidate to succeed him.

The Rev. John L. Pitts, of Frederick, Md. (brother of Charles H. Pitts, Esq. of Baltimore), left his residence on the 13th inst., in a distressed state of mind, and all efforts to obtain information in regard to him has as yet proved unavailing. Any information concerning him will be thankfully received by a distressed family, and a large circle of sympathetic friends.

Some of the Tyler press say that it is apparent that neither Mr. Van Buren nor Mr. Calhoun—the two prominent LoCo candidates—can possibly agree in—and as a sort of "palliative" for the dissension that exists, insinuates that Mr. Tyler is the man upon which "union" can be effected. Are you prepared for this compromise, democrats of Jefferson?

The New Hampshire Gazette, published at Portsmouth, and said to be the oldest Democratic journal in the State, has, named to its mast head the motley colored flag of John C. Calhoun for the Presidency, and Levi Woodbury for the Vice Presidency.

The notorious Jonathan D. Stevenson, the associate of Glentworth, has at length been rewarded, for his "services" rendered by the LoCofoes Governor of New York, who has appointed him Inspector General of Distilled Spirits of the city of New York. The situation is one of great profit.

The stock by the recent destructive earthquake must have been felt sensibly by at least some of the Clerk's in the various departments at Washington, as a number of them have been ejected from their former seats, and "thrown sprawling on their backs."

A Convention was lately held in Mississippi by the Locos, which broke up "amidst great excitement," in other words "in a row." The convention could not agree upon a candidate for the Presidency, and laid on the table resolutions nominating Mr. Van Buren for the Presidency, and Mr. Walker for the Vice Presidency. So goes the fight amongst the political squabblers; dissension is rife on every hand, and most truly is "every man's hand against his brother," in the question of "who shall be the candidate?"

The U. S. Gilmer, Wise, and Hunter,) deserted the Whig standard and are now the most open-mouthed reciters of its true principles. These gentlemen, who will be recalled, are candidates again for re-election, and there can hardly be entertained a hope of their defeat. This, then, only gives the chances for three, at best, out of the fifteen! If this be not a grand example of the species, we know not what is.

On motion, Samuel D. Baker and Thomas G. Baylor were appointed, to wait on Mr. Turner, and also to write to Mr. Gallaher, informing them of their selection by this meeting.

On motion of S. D. Baker, the meeting then proceeded to elect a Conference to meet in Convention at Winchester on the 30th inst., and the following gentlemen were appointed: George B. Stephenson, John M. Jewett, John Clauson, Ambrose Timberlake and Dr. John Quigley. And as alternates, A. R. Boteler, Joseph M. Manthey, Wm. Grantham, Adam S. Dandridge, T. Henkle.

Resolved That ROBERT Y. CONRAD, Esq. be recommended by this Meeting to the Convention to be held at Winchester on the 30th inst., as a suitable candidate to be placed before the people of this District for the next Congress.

Resolved That in this recommendation, we would not be understood as dictating the people of the other Counties of this District.

Resolved That the proceedings of this Meeting, together with the different Precinct Meetings in the County, be published in the Virginia Free Press.

The South part of this Island is now in a state of open insurrection. The insurgent army, composed of upwards of 6900 men, have taken possession of Anse d'Haingault, Anse-a-Veau, and Jeremie, and in the latter city have established a provisional government. A number of respectable Haytian merchants, and other individuals have been imprisoned. Dr. Lovell, an American citizen, much respected by the natives, and beloved by foreigners, is condemned to death. No witnesses having been called to corroborate the charges alleged against him, the United States Commercial Agent has been induced to report accordingly to your Secretary of State, requiring assistance and protection.

Business since the commencement of the revolt is entirely at a stand, and until political affairs are settled one way or the other, no collections will be made, and no produce, we fear will come to market.

Yesterday the pilot, brig of War, 16 guns. Captain Houston, anchored off this port, and on learning the critical state in which the British merchants are placed, set sail for Jamaica to obtain additional protection.
