Mr. EVERETT said: Mr. CHAIRMAN—May it please your Royal Highness, Ladies and Gentlemen, the intimation which has been given to me, that in consequence of the kind allusion you have been pleased to make to my country and myself, some acknowledgment is expected of me, induces me to intrude myself for a moment on your notice. Here I, sir, a very agreeable privilege, to be permitted to partake of the hospitality of this interesting occasion. We read in one of the delightful poetical productions, with which the literature of our common language has been enriched by Sir Walter Scott's of the Chielain, who, by the sound of his whistle, called up five hundred clamen from the thickets of a highland Glen.
