



THE TEXAS QUESTION.

ADDITIONAL EXECUTIVE DOCUMENTS. MESSAGES FROM THE PRESIDENT.

To the Senate of the United States: In answer to the resolution of the Senate of the 13th inst. requesting to be informed "whether a messenger has been sent to Mexico with a view to obtain her consent to the treaty with Texas, and if so, to communicate to the Senate a copy of the despatches which he bears, and a copy of the instructions given to the said messenger; and also to inform the Senate within what time said messenger is expected to return."

THE TEXAS TREATY.

The Globe of the 21st contains six columns of the speech delivered by Mr. Benton to the Executive Session of the Senate on the Texas Treaty. Mr. Benton had, it seems, on the 13th inst. submitted to the Senate the resolutions and his speech was intended to induce their passage by the Senate.
