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THE SENATE ON ANNEXATION.

The New York Tribune, generally well informed on the questions connected with the annexation of Texas, has published a series of articles before the House of the United States on the subject.

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THE PUBLIC LANDS.

On Monday, the 21st inst., the subject of the Public Land was called up by Mr. Wallace. It will be recalled that the only resolution passed by the House of Delegates in relation to the subject, was that of the 10th of September, 1841.

Resolved, That the aforesaid Resolution of the House of Delegates be rejected. Mr. Gallaher offered the following amendment, as an addition to the resolutions of the Select Committee.

Resolved, In the opinion of this General Assembly, that the Act of Congress of June, 1836, depositing with the States (and thereby indirectly depositing with the States) the proceeds of the Public Land, is a violation of the Constitution and breach of the faith of the United States.

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IMPORTANT FROM MEXICO.

Distal and Captives of Santa Anna.—A few Captives of Santa Anna in Texas.

Santa Anna has met another San Jacinto defeat, and is now a miserable captive in the hands of those over whom he has so long tyrannized.

The following letter from a correspondent at Tampico, furnishes us with the intelligence of the defeat and capture of Santa Anna.

TAMPICO, Jan. 14th, 1853. Dear Sir:—Dates from Mexico to the press. A desperate battle has been fought on the plains of Apatzen between Santa Anna, on the one side, and Bravo and Paredes, on the other, which ended in the total rout of the former who was captured in trying to make his escape!

Mr. Goodson of Louisiana offered an additional resolution, taking a broader ground; but this was voted down by a substitute of Mr. Walker's, leaving the subject to the discretion of the Senators, under their constitutional obligations.

When the House adjourned, a resolution was pending, offered by Mr. Edwards of Florida, in substance approving the joint resolution passed by the House of Representatives at Washington.
