CATTLE.—The offerings at the sales comprised 400 head, of which 134 were driven to Philadelphia, 100 remain unsold, and the balance, amounting to 266 head, were taken by city butchers at prices ranging according to quality, from \$1.75 to 2.50 per 100 lbs. on the hoof, equal to \$3.42 1/2 net.

WHEAT.—The market for Howard street Flour has undergone no change since our last report. Sales to a limited extent of mixed brands from stores at \$4.37, which is the prevailing rate. Some holders ask \$4.43 for choice brands of fresh ground flour of 100 lbs. at \$4.37. New Flour arrives from old mills with a ready sale at \$4.50. We note a sale of 1000 lbs. fine at \$4.25 and small lots of paper at quotations.

GRAIN.—Supplies of wheat arrive freely, and prices have a downward tendency, owing to the facility of the mills to do so much work as usual. We quote reds at 80 & 85 cents for good to prime—no occasional lots of very prime bringing \$1.00. We quote white wheats at 85 & 90 cents for ordinary to good, and 90 & 95 cents for prime.

WHEATY.—There is a fair demand, but the stock is very light. Sales of bbls. at 25 cents. Hides, worth being 12 cents.
