Negro Man Killed.—On Monday last, at Harpers-Ferry, a negro man by the name of Thomas Johnson, lost his life by the premature explosion of a blast, whilst engaged in getting rock. He was 31 years of age, and had been employed for several years by the U. S. Army, as one of their out-bands.—Spirit of Jeff.

Mad Dogs.—This whole vicinity is infested with mad dogs, and it behooves all persons to be on their guard. We hear that they are going at large in this place, and that a servant of the Rev. Mr. Boyd has been bitten by one of them. We also hear that the son of Col. Hill and one of his servants have been bitten by a horse, which was bitten by a mad dog. They are proving about in all directions, and we have just learned that a number of Mr. Seth Mason's cattle have been infected from their bite, and that he has taken the precaution to kill all that were supposed to have been called in, in each of the cases above referred to, and it is hoped that the awful consequences resulting from this awful malady may be averted. It is the duty of our police to be on the alert, and in every case to apprehend the slightest ground for the apprehension, to have the dog taken to the pound, where they may execute summary justice, whenever they meet strange dogs of the kind.

Shocking Accident.—We learn with regret, that Washington Cross, of Morgan County, as soon as the late Cassassa, and a young man of exemplary habits and of excellent business qualifications, were crushed to death, a few days ago, in the Machinery of his Mill, on Capon River. The accident is supposed to have occurred about 10 o'clock in the morning, as persons passing by about that hour observed the operation of the Mill to stop suddenly; but no suspicion as to its fate was excited until late in the evening, when the Mill was examined and his body found, shockingly mangled in the Machinery of the Mill. He was about 40 years of age.—Martinsburg Gazette.

A boat with fifteen men on board recently got fast in the ice on the river St. Lawrence, and every soul on board perished. It was reported that sixteen men had also perished on one of the islands in the river. Several vessels have been wrecked in the river within a short time past, and the entire crew of one of them were drowned. Many other vessels that sailed late from Montreal and Quebec are supposed to be fast in the ice somewhere on the river.

Baltimore and Ohio Railroad.—Mr. Davis presented, in the House of Representatives of Pennsylvania, on Wednesday last, a bill similar to that in the House of Representatives of Maryland, and Ohio, granting to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company the right to locate their road through the western part of that State, and to be referred to the appropriate committee, as soon as the committee are announced by the Speaker.

THE MARKETS.

CATTLE.—There was a fair supply of Beeves at the sales to-day. The prices ranging from \$1.75 to \$3 per 100 lbs. on the hoof, equal to \$2.50 to \$3.75 net. A few of extra quality brought \$3.25. Average rate of sales \$2.62 1/2.

HOGS.—We quote at \$3.50 to \$5.00, white, small and choice lots bring \$5.00 to \$6.00.

WHEAT.—Since the close of our last review the market for Howard St. Flour has been without excitement. To-day holders are asking \$3.25 without effecting sales. There are buyers at \$3.12, but to-day the rate named is \$5.

WHEAT.—Very little Wheat reaches the market. The few parcels received sell at 105 to 110 cts. for good to prime reds.

WHEAT.—Considerable sales were made to-day at 24 cents for 61 and 25 cents for 62 lbs.
