The Tories, who have been in the ascendancy in the Government for some years past, with Sir Robert Peel, who holds the office of First Lord of the Treasury, and the Duke of Wellington, who holds the office of Commander in Chief, at their head; the Whigs, who number among them Lord John Russell, who recently held the powers of forming a new Cabinet in his hands, and Lord Grey; and the *Radicals*, who are understood to go for separating the Church and State—who favor the abolition of the Corn Laws, and go for dispensing with a great deal that has always been deemed material integrant in the form of government peculiar to Great Britain. The *Radical* party ascribe Lord John Russell's failure to form a Cabinet to the fact of his neglecting their party and adhering to that of the Whigs, in the selection of persons to fill the various offices.
