SPEECH
OF
HON. HENRY BEDINGER.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES,
WASHINGTON, January 6, 1947.

The resolution of Mr. Harrell, under consideration when the House adjourned on the 25th of the month, and the debate thereon, was taken up, and Mr. Root's motion to lay on the table was negatived.

The bill was then taken up, in Committee of the Whole on the State of the Union, and Mr. Bedinger, of Indiana, addressed the committee in opposition to the administration, and in reply to some of the positions assumed by Mr. President Truman, in his "personal explanation" of the President's message, which he read from the desk of the President's office, and in which he had, in his management of the war, lost sight of that decorum which should characterize the acts of the Chief Magistrate with an effort to silence all inquiries into the conduct of the administration, and to have intruded with Santa Anna, who had done more to disgrace the Mexican name than any man ever at the head of the Mexican government. He defended Gen. Scott and his suggestions for drilling the troops during the summer, and sending them to the west of the United States, and declared that the President's statement of Gen. Scott, then expressed, notwithstanding the ridicule which it had been attempted to cast upon him and his "hasty pile of soap," now commands the admiration of his countrymen.
