Correspondence of the "Spirit of Jefferson."

KICKAPOO NATION, INDIAN TERRITORY,] CAMF KEELING, May 11, 1849.

The Charlestown (Va.) Mining Company crossed the Missouri River on Monday and Tuesday last, and encamped on the beach for several nights. The "b'hoys" stood it admirably-no tents erected-all took it on the sand, with the blue sky above, except those who were compelled to stand as sentinels, who had not where to lay their weary heads. Had you or your readers seen ns lassiating the mules, and dragging them on board the boat, you would have had an agreesble treat. We have reduced the art of lassoing to a perfect science, and we make considerable

display in this dexterous art. On Wednesday morning one-half of our train started for a camping ground seven miles distant. Of all miserable roads the one from the river to this point takes the lead. For miles the wagoas were sunken up to the hubs, and none of your regularly broken teams to help us out of the lurch, but instead thereof, the wildest sort of cattlemules that had never smelt leather before-they were everlastingly jumping Jim Crow, "first upon the heel taps, then upon the toe." As the shades of evening set in we arrived at this point, with no other mishaps than a wagon, midway, with a broken axle tree, and several " hounds" in

the same fix. On the next day, the other half of our train joined us. The unfortunate wagon had been "righted" but was soon in distress again, caused by the breaking of the tongue. Although we have our mules well picketed, it seems almost impossible to keep these wiry creaturesthey are like the cel, as soon as you think you have them securely, that's just the time your have at them! The other night we had a stampede on the small order-some twenty of our critters pulled up the pickets, and went it "kiting" over the prairie. After hard labor, and the loss of no small quantity of temper and sweat, they were secured. During night, mules will escape, doas we may-but we have been fortunate enough

to secure all, except probably three or four. We are already in the land of " snakes." We have killed rattlesnakes, moccasins, copperheads, &c. It is now with us "wake snakes, June-

bugs about." I have been in no section of country that presents half the inducements for locating, so far as nature is concerned. We are just on the bluff, overlooking two most beautiful and attractive prairies, rich with herbage-a clear rivulet sendsits gentle murmurings on the wings of the wind,

and at eventide, when all nature seems to be enjoying repose, it thrills upon the ear with a soft and charming cadence. May 12, 1849.

On vesterday afternoon we had a " shower."-It did no other damage than swim off some of our fifth chains and such other light gear! After the cessation of the rain I went a visiting tomy neighbors to see how they had fared. Their houses presented scenes of desolation-the richmarl being worked ready for the potter's handbeds, sacks, ovens, &c., towering up to keep them from the effects of the flood below.

We leave this in an hour for a camping ground some six miles distant. CAMP SEEVERS, May 13, 1849. The Company reached this point early on yesterday afternoon, designing to remain here until Monday morning. I started off, mounted on a Spanish mule, with a "cow-bell" around the nock of ahorse I was leading, and some thirty or forty mules following-so you see I was sort o' bell-wether for the flock. The country through whichwe passed has prairie extremely undulating --Some of the boys shot prairie hens, which make a most delicious fry. Last night I was on guard, stationed about onefourth of a mile from camp. Early in the night the wolves broke out in most dolorous cries, suffcient to awaken the sympathies of the hardest heart! 

It is stated that the French government has written to London, St. Petersburg, Berlin and Vienna, strongly deploting the interierence of Russia in Hungarian affairs, saying it will endeavor to put a stop to it by diplomatic means, and, in case of failure, they will apply to the National Assembly for advice.

M Fauchere, the Minister of the Interior, has resugned, and it is rumored that other Ministers will soon follow.

Sicily .- The Neapolitan army has been again defected. Sicily is again in a state of insurrec-

HUNGARY .- The fighting still goes on, and the brave Hungarians continue to be successful .---They are said to be within a lew days march of Vienna, to which the Russian army is also hastening.

DENMARK -The Danes have suffered another defeat, and it is said have accepted the proffered mediation of England. GERMANY .- There have been renewed disturb-

ances in various parts of Germany. At Frankfort the revolutionary movement is more and more decided.

ROME -Pope Pius the IX, on hearing of the resistance of the Romans to the French troops, is said to have declared that he would not return to Rome at such a price, and to have sent a message in consequence to the King of Naples and to Gen. Ondinot to induce them to retire.

In the meantime the French General has been reinforced by many thousand additional troops.

He has now doubtless a large and well appointed army under his command. But the enthusinem of the Romans is now at the highest pitch, and if a single or combined attempt to bombard and take Rome by storm should be made, the defence of the city by the means of barricades and the courage of the people, will be so well maintained that the Austrians are by no means certain of success. All accounts concur that it will be impossible to restore the Imperial power of the Papacy, in any form.

We have now before us the most frightful debiding places, by the Toulore, and put to death, On the 3d inst., in Baltimore, by Rev. A. A. A CAVE DISCOVERED. A cave has recently been discovered on the farm of David Funsten Esq., (Erin) Warren county Va., which deserves to be noticed .-It was found in one of the fields not far from Mr. I's residence, by an adventurous and exploring party, who were amply repuid for their trouble in fathoming its dar't recesses. It extends under ground some hundred and fifty vards, and the roof is a perfect arch of rock, supported by massive natural columns.

The explorers, with torches, pendirated the recesses of this curious cavern, and found many objects of interest-such as a rock in the shape of a pulpit &c. By the way, it is to be hoped that some good use will be made of this pulpit, thus fashioned to the hands, and prepared ready for its proper purpose. It is something singular that a curiosity of this kind should have remained the discovery no doubt had some such feelings, (though to be sure, the figure is only used as a comparison) as Columbus had when he first discovered the land of this western continent. They raised their hands in wonder at the scene which opened upon them, and though they halted at the entrance, from a natural trepidation, they soon boldly, in defiance of all obstacles, entered the cave, and never stopped their research, until they had fully completed its exploration. No wild beasts or banditti interrupted their progress, and the Sybil's Cave, at Erin, now




