SHEPHERDSTOWN IN THE OLDEN TIME.

JAMES RUMSEY AND STEAM BOATS.

We promised, in our notice of the officers and privates who served in the war of the revolution, to give an account of the experiments of James Rumsey in steam navigation. Although we feel prepared to prove that the world is indebted to the genius and perseverance of a citizen of Shepherdstown for the most useful invention of any age, we must express our regret that we cannot describe, in detail, all the circumstances and events connected with his history.

We do not claim that Rumsey was the inventor of the steam engine; on the contrary, we are free to admit that the power and usefulness of steam as an agent was known more than a century before his time. It is not, however, that he was the first to construct and carry into successful operation the plan of propelling boats by the application of a mysterious agency.

In a work published in Spain many years since, it is said, that among the original papers relating to the voyage of Columbus, preserved in the royal archives of Seville, was found a narrative, stating that Blas de Garay, a sea-captain, exhibited to the emperor and king Charles V., in the year 1545, an engine by which the motion of the largest size could be propelled, either a calm, without the aid of sails or wind.

It is generally conceded, that the first steam engine was constructed by James Watt in the year 1765, but it was adapted only to raising water, and that by the expansive force of steam, it was in June 14, 1809, Capt. Savery had for the first time, the engine of the marquis to apply it, with moderate success, to the machinery of mills.
