THE INDIANS.

Analysed in the character and condition of the Indian tribes of our continent has always been manifested by a people. This report may be highly regarded by a perusal of the Report of Lewis Lea, Esq., Commissioner of Indian Affairs—a document which we regret cannot be placed before all our readers.

The number of Indians under the control of our Government has been greatly increased by our acquisitions of New Mexico and California, and the appropriations necessary for the Indian Department for the past year will exceed two millions four hundred thousand dollars.

It will always be difficult to suppress the Indian's natural propensity for war. One of the Agents writes:—

"An ambition to acquire the furs and furs which are by all accounts a desired article of commerce, is a ruling passion in the breast of the Indian."

"This clearly shows that the vices of the white man are the most degrading of all those engaged in by the human family."

Gov. Ramsey, of Minnesota, embodies a great many striking facts in his Report to the Commission.

"Of the eminent superiority of manual labor, over other schools to stimulate habits of industry, and inculcate the modes of life, it is unnecessary to speak."

"The total failure of the agricultural operations of other systems, has been repeatedly demonstrated, under their operation."

"We could greatly extend these extracts; but to do so would be to repeat what we have already said."

"The Indian is a moral phenomenon, an anomaly among the races of man."

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THE CAPTIVE DAUGHTER OF MRS. WHITE.

The St. Louis Republican publishes the circular of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, addressed to D. S. Mitchell, Superintendent of Indian Affairs at St. Louis, apprising him that a reward of one thousand dollars is offered by the Indian Bureau for the recovery of the daughter of the late J. M. White.

The Commissioner states that Congress having appropriated five hundred dollars for the reward of this child, it is an anxious desire that she may be so exposed as to give full effect to the benevolent intention of that body.

"From the latest information received upon the subject," he says, "it is believed that she yet remains in captivity among the Apaches proper, or that mixed band termed 'laellares,' which for years past, have infested the vicinity of San Fernando de Taos, and the country between it and Bent's Fort, and the Santa Fe road, near the settlement of New Mexico; yet it is possible she may have been sold by her captors to Indians of some other tribe. She is now about thirteen years of age."

It is to be hoped that the benevolent design of Congress may be accomplished by the discovery and ransom of this child at an early day.

IMPROPER FOREIGN INTERFERENCE.

At a recent meeting of the Committee of the British and Foreign Anti-Slavery Society, held in London, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—

"Resolved, that this committee have witnessed with profound regret the acts of the United States Congress during its last session in relation to the subject of the North Atlantic Cable, and its denunciation of the spirit in which they were conceived, the principles on which they were based, and the objects they were intended to accomplish. That this committee more particularly reprobate and denounce the act for the seizure of fugitive slaves on our coast, and the denial of rights of humanity, and a daring violation of the law of nations. That this committee deeply sympathize with the colored population of the United States in their present struggle for freedom, and will earnestly exert their influence throughout the Union to use every legitimate means, and immediate abolition of this most iniquitous law."
