In the debate upon the reception of Kossuth by Congress, frequent allusion was made to the reception of Lafayette as a preliely announced that, "entertaining every wish to make the reception of General Lafayette as complimentary as possible," they yet found difficulties in the way of a joint reception, and considered it better that each and its own "form in the reception of that distinguished individual." 
