Having sailed thence, she stretched away to St. Helena ion the 4th of May she took her departure from that island and resched Plymouth on the Sth of June.

#### ARMORY AT MARPENS-FERRY.

It is known to most of our readers, that is consequence of the small appropriation for the U. N. Ar-mory (\$125 000 instead of \$180,000 as heretofore) some fifty or sixty of the operatives have been dispensed with. As some political capital is being made out of this fact, and as it has been stated that none but "Panikner men" have been deprived ot work, we deem it proper to give a few facts from the

The Commanding Officer, in giving instructions to the Master Armorer, says :

"In organizing the operations to be carried on at "this Armory during the ensuing year, I find that "to bring our work within the reduced appropria-"tion for the manufacturing of arms, it is necessa-ty to limit the manufacture of Muskets."

There are now in the Armory eight Inspectors or Foremen, and six Assistants-formerly fitteen in all-Mr. Rhulman's office being merged in the other Departments. The Commandiag Officer, in his order to the different Foremen, says :

"You will prepare a statement and hand it in to the Master Armorer as soon as you can complete it, of the number and kind of workmen you will require to keep up your Department for the work to be doue; and also a list of the workmen you think best fitted to perform the work.

"In selecting workmen it is my desire you should choose those best qualified, and who are persons of good conduct and character."

According to the above instructions the Foremen made the selection of those engaged-and omitted, from necessity, many competent and worthy gen. tiemen

For the information of those who assert that only "Faulkner men " have been proscribed, we will state that six out of the eight Foremen voted for Mr Faulkner-the other two not voting at all-and that all six of the Assistant Foremen also voted for Mr. F. Thus it will be seen that the unpleasant task of keeping out of employment "Faulkner men" devolved on "Faulkner men"-caused by the meagre appropriation. Now, where does the blame rest?

#### THE NATIONAL ARMORIES.

The Free Press with its characteristic partiality for the Military System, thus speculates upon the results of the Commission recently ordered by the President in pursance of the act of Congress :

THE UNITED STATES ARMY.

The whole number of effective men does not exceed 8,000, and these are scattered in small numbers over our widely-extended frontier. The Providence Journal mentions the fact that one-half of the army is employed upon the Mexican frontier at an annual expense of three millions of dollars! The Journal is a paper remarkable for its clear riews of national subjects, and states its proposiions with great force. It says :-

"Heavy as is the expenditure, the treaty stipulation to keep down the Indian aggressions is by no solemnized. Such record and certificate shall set means complied with, and cannet be. The country is in great part uninhabited and uninhabitable .--Where there is neither wood, water, nor soil, a permanent population cannot be sustained. The preject of a railroad, without going forty miles into Mexican territory a part of the way, is quite out of the question ; and, even if this concession could be obtained, it is very doubtful if a railroad can be kept up across such a desolate country. We have no doubt that if Mexico would take back the whole of New Mexico it would be a great favor to this country. The territory is valueless, its protection is enormously expensive, and the only possible use that can be made of it is to furfish pretext for another war with the unfortunate and crumbling Government which we have already despoiled of half its territory. Gad is very merciful, and the country, great and powerful, rich and prosperous, can bear a great deal ; bot the offended laws of our being will yet vindicate themselves, and nations, as well as individuals, must take the consequences of their own guilt."

There may be another very potent reason operating upon the Desceracy to cause their minds to undergo a change on this subject. The sad reality that the Brigadier's Administration is to prove a failure, is forcing itself upon hem ; and that the course of that Administration would restore the Whig party to life, though it be dead. MARBIAGE CERTIFICATES.


