The Thirty-Fifth Congress closed its session on Monday—a shorter one by about two months than the average length of first sessions has been for many years past.

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James Callitt, a free negro, charged with the murder of Samuel Brock, also a free colored man, about five miles from Winchester, in February last, was tried before the Circuit Court of Frederick County, on Thursday last.

Margaret Lucas, charged with the murder of Thomas Gordon—free negro—was taken up on Friday. The jury rendered a verdict of "murder in the second degree," and fixed her punishment at 5 years in the Penitentiary.

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SENATOR HALE PROPERLY RE-VERENCED.

We have already noticed the unbecoming manner in which the Rev. S. H. Tyng disturbed the ashes of his dead son, Rev. D. A. Tyng, by continuing to parade the political anti-slavery sentiments of one of his sermons which lost him his clerical position in Philadelphia—Senator Hale, who is always seeking to make mischief when anti-slavery is involved, heard the sermon of Rev. Mr. Cummins at Washington, which, while speaking very highly of the merits of the deceased Rev. D. A. Tyng, contained the following expression:

"He was not perfect. He committed one error—one deep, grave, awful error. He introduced a political question into his pulpit. He did it but once, and although nearly three years of his ministry have elapsed since that time, it was never repeated, and I firmly believe that he earnestly and deeply repented of this error."

Hale wrote to Rev. S. H. Tyng to know whether his late son, either directly or indirectly, manifested or expressed any regret, or of repentance of the course he so manifestly assumed, and, as his admirers have supposed, so truly and faithfully testified his death.

There is not the slightest foundation in truth for the statement that my son in any way or shape, ever expressed regret, or desired to do so, his solemn and well-considered protest against the oppression of slavery.

This correspondence calls out Rev. Mr. Cummins, who, through the "National Intelligencer," denies the statement of Senator Hale, that he had represented the position of the late Rev. D. A. Tyng on the slavery question, as the great error of his life.

What he did say was, that Mr. Tyng had committed a grave and most serious error in bringing the discussion of a political subject into the pulpit. And in the same sermon, he said, Rev. Dr. Cummins added, what Mr. Hale forgot to state, that in his judgment, the great enemy of the Gospel had never been so powerfully exposed as by the progress of the Gospel in this land, than the attempt of ministers of religion, and churches and religious societies, to interfere in the heated strife of the politics of the day.

The great principle advanced in that sermon is one which, in my judgment, is one of the chief of the Protestant Episcopal church in this country, viz: that the Episcopal church is a Church of Christ, and is solely confined to matter purely spiritual and religious. This principle has been sanctioned by the almost unanimous practice of our bishops and clergy through all the history of the church in this country, and in every part of the land—North, South, East and West.

The Episcopal church does not ask her ministers and members to think alike on any topic. Doubtless, there are pro-slavery and anti-slavery men within her pale, but, as far as my knowledge goes, the late Mr. Tyng was the first to discuss this exciting subject in an Episcopal pulpit. I believe it to have been an error, and as I was setting him forth in his character as an example to young men, I could not, without compromising my own views of duty, hesitate to state my belief. Had Mr. Tyng taken an opposite position to Senator Hale's, it would not have altered in the least my opinion of the error committed by him.

Dr. Cummins threatened—Quite an excitement has been created in the church circles of Washington by Dr. Cummins' reply upon Rev. Dudley A. Tyng. The latter is denounced as having been a virulent abolitionist, and his eulogists are classed in the same category.
