Protest of the Jefferson County Supervisors to Gov. Boreman

We publish to-day for the benefit of our readers the manly protest of Messrs. McCurdy, Johnson and Logie-members of the Board of Supervisors in Jefferson county-to the Governor of the State. It speaks for itself, and evinces a perception of the law applicable to, and the duty of the Supervisors, in a single sentence or two, which, for clearness of expression and brevity cannot be excelled :

THE PROTEST.

CHARLESTOWN, WEST VIRGINIA,) Nov. 11, 1865.

To His Excellency, Governor Boreman :

We, the undersigned, Supervisors in the County of Jefferson, beg leave to apprise you of the action of the Board of Supervisors—at its session of Tuesday last—in reference to the throwing out of the entire vote of the Charles"

town Township: This Township cast 267 votes—266 were cast for Judge Kennedy, and 1 for Mr. Hall. On the day fixed by law for the Supervisors to meet and certify the returns, the Supervisors of Charlestown and Osborne Townships left He says: here together, early, and repaired to Shepherds-

We were informed that counsel present stated Batting, Fence Pales, Lime, Hair, Ce-Bricks, Paints, Linseed Oil, Varnish, that they would like to be heard, and met with a like refusal. tine, Windows, (glazed and unglazed) Doors, Window and Door-Frames,

We consider that the law does not authorize the Board of Supervisors to throw out any Township, but, on the contrary, clearly pro-hibits it. They must certify the elections as they get them from the Inspectors of each Township. Except for County and Township officers, they are not the judges of the returns and qualifications of any parties elected, and, even in these cases they can sit only as a Court having jurisdiction to try a question of contested election in the form prescribed by law. We regard the action of the Board as an usurpation of power unwarranted by the law, in direct violation of its commands, and that its effects are to do away altogether with the right of the people to choose their own servants; because it puts in the power of the Supervisors the absolute control of the right of suffrage, and they can say who is and who is not elected. We do not think it was the intention of the law to take away from the people this right and confer it upon the Board of Supervisors .-We, therefore, feel it to be our duty to protest in the strongest language against their action, and ask your Excellency to order the returns to be given to such candidates as appeared to have been elected, or take such other action to

preserve the rights of the people, and carry out the manifest intention of the law as to you may seem proper in the premises. JOHN W. MCCURDY,

Railroad Enterprise.

According to a pleasant correspondent of the National Intelligencer, writing from the West, the enterprise of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad never flags: He says:

The Work of Re-Union.

It is evident that some of the Ultras of th Republican party are attempting to circumvent the President in his efforts to restore the Union fully and bring back the era of good feeling .- the incom party majority may be seriously diminished, if not actually destroyed. They are, in fact, the only Disunionists at present in the country .--They are doing all they can to embarrass the President, and this in face of the fact that the Southern States, with but slight exceptions, are

much more than might have been expected. from which we make an extract,

of vindication and defence-vindication and defence of the majesty of the nation-so now he is all for peace, for the supremacy of the Constitution and of the laws made under it, exacting no needless forfeitures of war, but demanding such, and such only, as are plainly essential to the future permanence, peace, and glory of the American Union. The policy of the President does not regard this Government as a government of force, under any disguise nor by any tortuous construction. On the contrary, the leading idea of the Administration is that the reciprocal relations of parent and children obtain between Federal authority and the States in their limited sovereignty, as the American law of consent and interpretation defines these terms called "limited sovereignty."

"As this Union was founded in mutual confidence of man in man, the whole edifice resting on the honesty and patriotism of the people, so now the President proclaims the theory that the rebellion has only been a foul excresence He does not admit that it has changed the theory of the Government-that it has, like a mortal ulcer, eaten out the vitals of the Constitution; but, on the contrary, that the sore being extirpated, all that then remains is to foster the general body into health by such saving processes of statesmanship and by such watchful care as shall restore what has been functionally and not organically deranged. He, therefore, trusts the people, since the Government is theirs, holding only such arbitrary authority over them as belongs to his parental relation as the head of an organized family, who have deputed to him, through the family bond of the Constitution, the duty and the right and the power to maintain and enforce the general harmony and safety. Hence the Presiden acts as the President of the UNITED STATES. and not as one who is to be moved into vengeful measures by passionate clamor in the North nor into unwise concessions by appeals from the South."

Views of a Statesman.

Senator FOOT, of Vermont, a gentleman of sound views and liberal temper, has furnished for publication a letter from Judge Redfield, a distinguished jurist of Boston, upon what is truly called " a question of vital national interest," the Reconstruction of States. He takes the ground that it is now settled by the judgment of the war, if not before, that the ordinances of secession were mere nulities, as corporate acts of the States. These acts no more bind the inhabitants of the several States dragged into rebellion than the majority vote of the members of any other corporation could bind the other members to the commission of theft, or murder, or any other crime. -

The only ground (he contends) upon which the forfeiture of State rights is maintainable will be to treat the act of rebellion as working a forfeiture of all legal rights under the Constitution. This might fairly enough be so treated. provided the act of rebellion were one which had the legal assent of the entire population in the rebellious States. But that is a result which no sound lawyer will for a moment attempt to argue; for it is certain that large portions of the white population did not willingly. assent to the act of secession. Multitudes resisted it as long as they could. It cannot, therefore, be declared with any propriety, that any of their rights are forfeited.

The learned judge does not consider the formation of new State Constitutions as at all involving the question of negro suffrage. He does not comprehend how the National Government has any thing to do with that question .-The National Constitution formally recognises that as an inherent and unsurrendered State right. And he well says that "the elective franchise, and right of defining it, is one of the fundamental powers of all free government. one which cannot be taken away, except by the clearest concession, without the utter annibilation of the very first principles of national liberty,"
